

## Native Title Protection Conditions Form 10 – Clause 9.2 (b) Version 4

This is an example of a notice required under the Native Title Protection Conditions. An alternate form that complies with the requirements of the Native Title Protection may be used. The Department has produced this form but takes no responsibility for any subsequent unauthorised changes to it.

**Purpose**: This form may be used where Notified Native Title Parties are required to give written notice to an Explorer in response to the Cultural Heritage Find was discovered while conducting the Exploration Activities. **Definitions** of some of the terms in this form are in Schedule 1 of the Native Title Protection Conditions.
